#### A-1. Public Comments

#### **B-1. 2015 VSBA Student Art Contest Winners**

On March 17, 2015, the Lynchburg City School Board recognized three students who represented the Lynchburg City Schools at the 2015 VSBA Southern Regional Forum. During the Forum, the students won or placed in the Southern Regional Art Contest. They are Angel Collins, Linkhorne Elementary School – First Place; Iyanna Ware, Linkhorne Middle School – Second Place; and Kate Ruehle, E. C. Glass High School – Second Place. Miss Collins' artwork will be displayed in the offices of the VSBA in Charlottesville and the Richmond offices of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

During this presentation, the students were presented with VSBA certificates of recognition.

#### **B-2. Teacher Recruitment Campaign**

The school administration has developed a teacher recruitment campaign intended to reach teachers ages 27 to 50 living in big city areas in Northern Virginia and surrounding areas to come to Lynchburg to teach. The school board viewed a short segment along with longer video which focused on teachers who had moved to Lynchburg from a large metropolitan area and the benefits they found teaching and living in Lynchburg. Emails are also being sent to individuals through the use of an advertising agency who specializes in marketing to specific groups. Over the next few weeks, more videos are planned that will focus on specific demographics of teachers for recruitment to the Lynchburg City Schools.

## C-1. Finance Report

The school administration, in accordance with the 2014-15 school operating budget, authorized, approved, and processed the necessary payments through March 31, 2015. The school administration certifies that the amounts approved are within budgetary limits and revenue.

Mr. Beckles announced that we are three-quarters of the way through the school year, and he is monitoring the tax revenue noting that there will be a shortfall of about \$100,000 as number have been flat for the past two months. He also explained that the finance department continues to experience challenges with the current financial software package

due to disencumbering issues that are not being calculated properly. The finance department has a manual system in place that is used to correct these issues. He hopes to have a new system in place within the next 18 months.

#### F-1. Capital Improvement Plan: Paul Laurence Dunbar Middle School for Innovation

The capital improvement plan includes \$400,000 in construction funding for replacement of the Paul Laurence Dunbar Middle School for Innovation central building roof. The City of Lynchburg Office of Procurement and Purchasing has received bids on the project.

A total of four bids for the Dunbar roof replacement project was received. The school administration recommends W. A. Lynch Roofing Co. based on their base bid of \$447,814 which was the lowest bid. All bids received are listed below. Additional funding in the amount of \$47,814 will need to be transferred from the roof contingency project.

Given school board approval, the funds to purchase the items will come from available funds in the existing operating budget.

The school administration requests this budget adjustment be approved for the 2014-15 school year in order to fund these one-time purchases.

Mr. Beckles explained that the items listed are deferred maintenance items that aren't covered under the regular operating budget. It was also explained that the GPS request is for equipment and service contract for 20 vehicles. Maintenance vehicles will be tracked so that when a call or work order comes in from a particular site, we will be able to determine if a maintenance worker is already at the site who can review the problem thus eliminating an additional worker's time to travel to the site when someone is already there.

#### **G-2.** Implementation of Online Payment Portal

Lynchburg City Schools is currently utilizing *MySchoolBucks*, formerly *Prepay Café*, through the School Nutrition Department. LCS parents have the ability to pay for their child's lunch online through *MySchoolBucks*. The online website gives the parent a step-by-step report of what their child is spending their money on and a sense of peace knowing that they do not have to send cash to the school with their child.

Early this school year, the school administration implemented *MySchoolBucks* school store as a pilot at five schools, Sheffield Elementary School, Robert S. Payne Elementary School, Sandusky Middle School, E.C. Glass High School, and Heritage High School. The results of the pilot programs have revealed that users like the ease and convenience of making payments online instead of sending cash with students. As we continue to find ways to efficiently and effectively use technology, LCS has decided to expand the ability for parents and students to pay online by implementing *MySchoolBucks* school store division wide. Parents and students will be able to pay all student activity fees online, such as, field trips, purchase tickets for sporting activities, club and drama events, etc.

The purposes for implementing MySchoolBucks school store is to:

- 1). Provide an online payment portal for the convenience of parents and students,
- 2). Reduce the amount of time teachers spend collecting and tracking funds collected from students.
- 3). Reduce the amount of cash at the schools, and
- 4). Reduce the amount of time administrative staff spend processing and accounting for cash transactions.

LCS will also be taking advantage of *MySchoolBucks* Anywhere (MSB Anywhere). This mobile payment device accepts debit/credit cards and will enable parents to make payments at the school.

Payments will be able to be made by checks (ACH), debit and credits. The system will allow the school to set up payment plans if necessary. The cost for the online payment portal is a 3.95 percent per transaction fee (flat rate) that will be paid by the school division.

# G-3. Special Education Annual Plan/Part B, Section 611, Flow-through Application and Section 619 Preschool Grant Applications: 2015-16

The Annual Special Education Plan is a formal agreement between the local school board and the Virginia Board of Education for the implementation of state and federal laws and regulations related to services mandated for students with disabilities. Accordingly, the disbursement of funds to the school division is contingent upon school board approval of the plan. Therefore, Lynchburg City Schools will apply for \$2,128,366.00 in special education flow-through funds for the 2015-16 school year. The application for funds for the 2015-16 school year must be approved by the school board and submitted to the Virginia Department of Education for plan approval and financial reimbursement. A total amount of \$1,956,142.94 of this funding will be used to provide salaries for special education staff, and \$172,223.06 of the 611 flow-through funds will be used to provide special education and speech therapy services to parentally-placed students with disabilities attending local private schools.

The Lynchburg City Schools will also apply for \$58,508.00 in Section 619 Preschool Funds for the 2015-16 school year. This funding will be used to support Hutcherson Early Learning Program as they provide special education and related services to preschool children (ages 2-5) who have been determined eligible for special education services. Funds provide inclusion support through special education placements in local private preschools staff development and instructional materials.

Mr. VanDerwerker noted that the amount is \$18,000 less than last year due to parent placement of students in private facilities.
