Ms. Kathy Hudson, Lynchburg Education Association representative, offered remarks to the school board about its 2013-14 legislative positions.

C-1. American Education Week: November 18 – 22, 2013

In 1921, the National Education Association representative assembly in Des Moines, Iowa, called for the designation of one week each year to be designated to public education awareness. The resolution called for an educational week to be observed in all communities once a year to inform the public of the accomplishments and needs of public schools and to secure the support of the public in meeting those needs. This resolution stemmed from the fact that in 1919, 25 percent of the country's World War I draftees were illiterate, and nine percent were physically unfit. The first observance of American Education Week occurred December 4-10, 1921, with the NEA and American Legion as cosponsors.

This year marks the 91st Annual American Education Week (AEW) spotlights the importance of providing every child in the United States with a quality public education from kindergarten through college and the need for everyone to do his or her part in making public schools great. C-2. Lynchburg City Schools' Award for Excellence in Science

Dr. Charles W. Pryor, Jr. and his family are pleased to announce a four-year, \$25,000.00 scholarship to be awarded every school year for the next four years to an outstanding senior interested in entering a science-related field of study. The award will be distributed to an institution of higher learning over a four-year time period with an installment of \$3,125.00 each semester.

Dr. Pryor is a graduate of both E. C. Glass High School and Virginia Tech. He spent 25 years with the Babcox and Wilcox Company serving as President of the Nuclear and Power Division. While in Lynchburg, Dr. Pryor served as a member of the Lynchburg City School Board and past chairman of the Lynchburg City Schools' Partners in Education program. His complete biography is included as an attachment to this agenda report.

The award will be given to the top senior science student as determined by a selection process that includes a written application, a letter of interest, three letters of recommendation, an official transcript, and an interview with the division-level selection committee.

Dr. Brabrand and members of the school board thanked Dr. Pryor and his family for this generous scholarship and for the leadership he has provided to this community.

F. Student Representative Comments

Miss Sara B. Natour, student representative for E. C. Glass High School, and Ms. Alexis T. Johnson, student representative for Heritage High School, provided comments about the events and activities occurring at their high schools.

G-1. School Security Equipment Grant

On November 5, 2013, the Lynchburg City School Board authorized the school administration to enter into a contract with Crist Communications in the amount of \$125,458.12 for the installation of surveillance camera systems at each elementary school. Following the meeting, school administration learned that the bid tabulation submitted by the city was incorrect and did not reflect the adjustment in cameras and licenses. As a result, the school administration needs to request that the school board authorize the school administration to enter into a contract with Crist Communications in the amount of \$101,982.37. Further, the school board will need to authorize the superintendent to sign a change order so that the \$125,000 threshold is met for the grant. As the change order exceeds five percent, the school administration needs approve prior to executing the change order. This is a procedural matter that needs to be corrected for accounting purposes.

G-2. High School Weighted Courses

At its meeting on November 5, 2013, the Lynchburg City School Board received information regarding changing the weight of courses offered through Central Virginia Governor's School for Science and Technology, Early College, XLR8 Regional Governor's STEM Academy, and dual enrollment to 5.0 for an "A." Based on school board comments and further discussion by the administration, a revised proposal was presented to the school board.

Under the revised proposal all core content academic courses (math, English, science, and social studies) in all programs listed above will be weighted at 5.0 for an "A." All courses previously weighted at 4.5 will remain at 4.5 weight for an "A." Other courses will be weighted at 4.0 for an "A." All Central Virginia Governor's School courses will be weighted at 5.0 for an "A."

If approved, these changes in course weight will be included in the 2014-15 High School Program of Studies. Because of the significant impact on students' course selections, this portion of the 2014-15 High School Program of Studies will be presented at the next school board meeting. These weight changes will be effective for the 2014-15 school year.

H-1. Collaborative Review of Elementary School Improvement Plans

In 2012-13, each school developed a School Improvement Plan that identified goals and strategies around the three priorities of the school division's Comprehensive Plan: Achievement, Behavior, and Culture. Schools identified as focus schools and schools accredited with warning also incorporated three state-required goals and strategies. In all of these schools student achievement improved, as evidenced by four out of five schools meeting annual measurable objective benchmarks and two out of three focus schools achieving full accreditation.

Based on the success of these five schools, in 2013-14, school improvement teams at each school have used the state's *Indistar* school improvement tool to update and modify its School Improvement Plan and have incorporated the three state suggested indicators. Using data from 2012-13, each team reviewed the plan's indicators of success and tasks designated for each indicator to develop a plan for this year. Included in each plan are tasks around the identification of students in need of intervention, the assigning of these students to an intervention, and the monitoring of the success of each intervention.

School board members have received copies of the School Improvement Plans for each school. The presentation focused on the plans for the eleven elementary schools.

Each month, elementary principals meet as professional learning communities. During these meetings, they share information about programs and activities at their respective school that are helping to improve student achievement. Mrs. Karen S. Nelson, principal at Perrymont Elementary School, shared information about i-Ready that being used for reading and math. The online instructional software helps to profile groups and identify learning path and learning path tools that address a student's deficit skills. The teachers are able to closely monitor student progress and adjust tools as necessary. Teachers have also been able to develop meaningful SMART Goals in the areas of reading and math as a result of using this software.

Mr. Daniel J. Rule, principal at Dearington Elementary School for Innovation, provided information about how elementary schools are using Interactive Achievement. The program offers SOL-type test questions and gives students experience taking SOL-like tests on line. This also allows teachers to receive immediate feedback on student deficits so that teachers can modify and adjust lessons accordingly.

Mrs. Kathleen M. Sawyer, principal at Linkhorne Elementary School, shared information about the new reading series Harcourt Journeys, which is a well-organized, structured reading program with a strong phonics base. There are many components of the series, one of which is a focus wall that can be accessed in paper or online. The focus wall provides information about what the students will be learning for a particular week and offers decodable books for students at different reading levels and many other resource materials that reinforce what the student is learning for a particular week.

PBIS, which is being implemented throughout the school division, is a positive behavioral incentive support program that provides tiered models of intervention which allows teachers and administrators to collect and document data on students. This program is helping teachers to look at interventions for student behavior rather than seeking punitive options for students.

H-2. Legislative Positions: 2013-14

Annually, the Lynchburg City School Board considers legislative positions to present to its state representatives. Attached are position statements for the school board to consider. As directed, the administration will develop new position statements, edit those listed in the attachment, and present any revisions and additions for approval at the December 3, 2013, meeting.

There are several new legislative positions that have been proposed to the school board. The school board, through consensus, supported the new positions. It was also requested that language relative to increased compensation for teachers be changed to include all employees and that more refined language regarding the position associated with binding arbitration could be refined.

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The school board will consider action on this item at the December 3, 2013, school board meeting.

H-3. Lynchburg Juvenile Detention Center Education Program Budget: 2013-14

The 2013-14 funding for the Lynchburg Regional Juvenile Detention Center Education Program in the amount of \$884,649.54 has been approved by the Virginia Department of Education. Lynchburg City Schools serves as the fiscal agent for this state-operated program. Lynchburg City Schools employs nine teachers, a principal, and a full-time administrative secretary at the Lynchburg Regional Juvenile Detention Center where educational services are provided to approximately 25 students.
